Post-Bacc

Programs

1-2 years

Application process

Follows timeline similar to grad school apps

You are hired in a full-time research position

Time dedicated to research job

Time dedicated to academic preparation (courses, workshops, seminars)

Requirement to apply is that you intend to pursue a research program

Grad school application resources and preparation

Job

Length varies

Fill out a job application (CV, cover letter, elevator pitch)

You are hired in a full-time or part-time research position

Job is to move the research forward

You can still get great mentorship and take the lead on projects

Should be seen as a steppingstone

You can still get grad school application resources and prep

Materials should include information about your prior research experience(s) and/or barriers that have prevented you from obtaining research experience. If your past research experience is limited, describe your research interests for the future.

Post-Bacc

Some job names:

- Research Assistant (RA)
- Laboratory Manager
- Post-Bac Researcher
- Research Technician
- Research/Project/Study Coordinator
- Post Grad Research Associate

- Bachelors in psychology, cognitive science or related field.
- 1-2 years of related research experience (or an equivalent combination of education and experience may be considered)
- Strong organizational skills
- Keen attention to detail
- Very responsible, good time management
- Administrative experience and experience working with children is preferred
- Must be comfortable interacting with children, with undergraduate students, and community members
- Computer literacy
- Experience with specific software and apparatus used in the lab (ex. Qualtrics, eye-tracker, R, SolidWorks)

Masters or PhD?

Masters

2 years

Predominantly coursework, usually with a culmination project/thesis

Non-funded or limited assistantships

If you have a specific career or profession in mind and want to develop the necessary practical skills for that

PhD

5-7 years

~2 years of coursework combined with independent research work. After coursework is done, more focused on independent research work

PhD projects often come with some level of funding equivalent and tuition fees are waived in exchange for being a teaching or research assistant

If your goal is to become a university professor or to dedicate your career to researching at companies/other institutions

Commonly, a master's degree is integrated into a PhD program. But terminal masters are not guaranteed.

Master's and doctorate degrees prepare you for different occupations and work positions, and which one is the right for you depends on what kind of career you are planning to pursue.

Spend some time thinking why a PhD:

Worse reasons

- You want a PhD to validate that you are a smart, worthy person
- You love college and would like to remain on a college campus by any means possible
- You aren't sure what to do with your life, but liked your psychology classes



Better reasons

- You have worked as a researcher in one or more psychology or neuroscience labs and loved the experience
- You find yourself thinking about psychology-related research questions and how to answer them even in your spare time
- You frequently find yourself gravitating to research related news stories and wishing you had been the one conducting the exciting research you read about



Psychology PhD Areas:

Clinical	Developmental	Cognitive	Social
Tends to take more of a medical/disease-oriented model. Diagnosing different mental health concerns, treating specific disorders.	Aims to explain growth, change and consistency through the lifespan. Prenatal, cognitive, social/emotional, language and Communication, attachment, etc.	How the human brain works and how people think, learn, and make decisions.	How people's thoughts, feelings, beliefs, intentions, and goals are constructed within a social context and interactions.

There are more areas! They tend to be interdisciplinary, and/or combine neuroscience methods

When do I know I'm ready?

Research experience is heavily emphasized

- Often full time RA positions after undergrad
 - Less common to be accepted right after UG
- Obtaining Research Experience
 - Research labs at UG school
 - Paid RA positions after UG
 - Volunteer research positions
 - Course requirements (independent studies, honors thesis, etc.)

Quality over Quantity!

Presentations and Publications are a big plus!

Applications timeline:



-Some schools/programs do not require GRE anymore, but most Clinical programs do.
-PIs have personal policies about being contacted.

-Everyone's timeline is different!

Define your research interest:

- What is most exciting to you? What do you keep coming back to?
- Determine your broad research question
- What do you need to answer it? Just behavioral data or also neuroimaging?
- Can you write it in 1-2 sentences?

Kate's: Intergenerational transmission of mental health risk from parent child and the biological mechanisms that underlie these processes.

Jenny's: Understanding how relationships in early life are related to development and well-being.

How to identify potential PIs:

- Identify researchers whose work excites you
- Talk to your research mentors
- Focus on both the mentor and the program
- Found a great potential mentor? Is there someone else in the program whose work might align?
- You want to identify 2-3 potential mentors per institution!

You apply to the PI, but both PI and institution are important!

PI's expectations can vary!

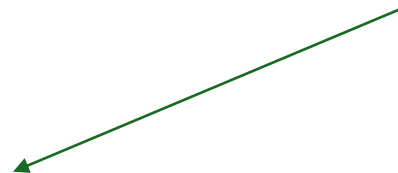


Alexis Briant

Alexis is a Susan Nolen-Hoeksema Postdoctoral Fellow at Yale and a member of the CANDLab. She completed her B.A. at the State University of New York at Geneseo and her Ph.D. in Developmental Psychology at Virginia Tech. Alexis's research focuses on how adversity and social determinants of health shape neurodevelopment and mental health during childhood and adolescence. She aims to identify factors that exacerbate risk for psychopathology, as well as factors that promote resilience and adaptation in youth. Alexis's work is embedded within a developmental psychopathology framework, and she leverages interdisciplinary approaches, multiple levels of analysis, and longitudinal modeling to understand and mitigate disparities in youth mental health. GRE+TOEFL/IELTS:

English Proficiency:

-Often required for international students; however, commonly waived if you are from certain countries or have completed undergrad or a master's degree at an English-speaking university.

GRE:

-Graduate Record Examination composed of 2 verbal reasoning, 2 quantitative reasoning, and 1 essay section (offered most days of the week)

-GRE Psyc Subject Test: Covers broad information taught in introduction to Psyc courses (only offered 3-4 times per year)

Do not wait to take the test, in case you need to retake it. Retaking this might take time.

-Low GPA, you can try to "impress" with your GRE scores.

-But most schools take a holistic approach to applications, but always good to double check!

-GRE is being used less and less, but always double check!



Identify Your Priorities:

- Identify your research interests before looking for potential PIs
- What mentorship style would work for you? Lab size/vibe? Co-mentoring?
- Finances: How much does it cost to apply to that school? Can you live in that area on that stipend?
- Geographical limitations: Can you afford to relocate? Do you need/want to live in a big city? Do you need/want to be close to your family?
- Considering moving with a partner? Need to identify priorities together
- International students: Is funding guaranteed? Are there grants/fellowships that do not require US citizenship or permanent residency? The visa sponsored by the program allows you to work long term in the US? OPT?

Rank your priorities! Where are you flexible where are you not?

Identify **Their** Priorities:

- Research fit!!!
- Experience and interest, what do you bring to the table!
- What progress does the advisor generally expect from a student in the course of a semester?
Submission/Publication pace?
- Motivated and up for the challenge!

Reaching out to potential PIs:



- PIs have different policies! Some encourage that you email them, for others this is a hard no!

Reaching out to potential PIs:

Intro: Your name, university affiliation/student status/current place of employment or position, and reason for writing.

Example: Hi, my name is (x), and I am currently in my (nth) year of the (degree name) program at (school name). I am writing to ask if you are taking students for the (Fall/Spring, year) semester.

Body: Very brief elevator pitch/statement of your research interests, current or representative projects, and how that relates to their brand of research.

Example: Broadly, I am interested in (xyz). Currently, I am working on a project about (xyz). This seems like a good fit with your research interests because (xyz).

Closing: Thank the professor for their time! (You can also let them know if you're attending any upcoming conferences in your shared field of study, in case they want to meet you).

Example: Thank you so much for your time! If you are attending SSSP this October in Tennessee, it would be great to talk in person.

You decide to apply? Time to get organized!

- Online account
- Statement of Purpose / Research Statement
- Personal Statement
- CV
- Transcripts
- Letters of recommendation (often 3)
- Diversity Statements (sometimes)
- Writing Sample (sometimes)
- Standardized tests

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Materials Overview - Statements:

Personal statement: Is a narrative that highlights your motivation for your research interests, how everything that you have done up to now prepared you for the next step. Opportunity to provide greater context about who you are as a person.

Statement of Purpose/Research Statement: State your broad research question, elaborate on your research experiences, reiterate your career goal in the context of your research experience. Discuss why you are qualified, talk about your skills. Discuss what about the lab/program excites you and how you will benefit from the lab/program. Explain why you are a good fit!

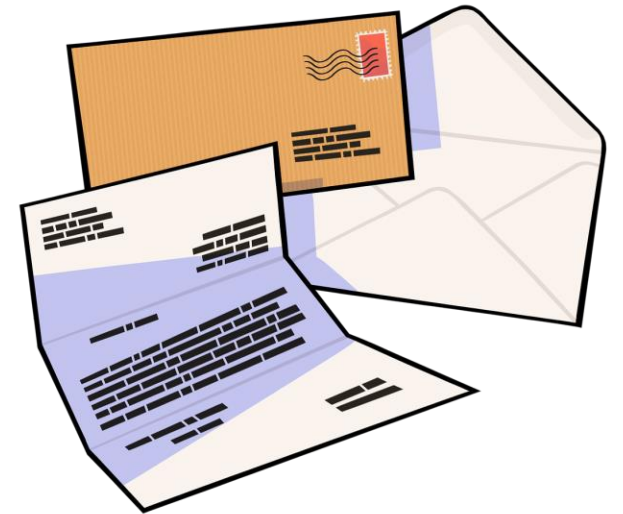
